

BISHOP'S FALL REFLECTION



"Let us hold unswervingly to the hope we profess, for He who promised is faithful." Heb 10:23)

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Greetings and peace in the Lord!

When we think about hope, we can see that it was present at the very beginning of creation, when God endowed everything with His creative Spirit, giving us the universe, the world, human beings, and everything in it.

Although His plans were frustrated by the devil and sin, that hope remained undimmed because God gave us the gift of His Son, "Christ Jesus our Hope," who rescued us from sin and death, and gave us the hope of eternal life.

Accordingly, when we talk about hope, we are really talking about a person—Jesus Christ. He is the source and the reason for our hope.

This is why we say that hope is not optimism. While both involve a positive expectation for the future, optimism is more a belief that things will turn out well, that everything will be OK. Hope on the other hand, is grounded in the person of Christ, on whom we place our trust and confidence "for nothing will be impossible with God," (Lk 1.37) and for whom "all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to His purpose." (Rom 8.28)

Therefore, hope isn't something as we say, "you can take it or leave it." No, we have hope because we have Christ. As Emeritus Pope Benedict reminded us in his Encyclical

Letter, Spe Salvi, "before their encounter with Christ they were without hope and without God in the world." (Eph 2.12). Our hope then is deeply rooted in Faith as well. I have hope because I have faith in God and faith in Christ Jesus, whose life was full of expectation and promise. Jesus' life and ministry gave hope to everyone who encountered Him because, when He poured out His love and mercy, forgiveness and healing, He also gave people hope.

When our late Pope Francis announced Jubilee 2025, he called us as "Pilgrims of Hope." Pope Francis wanted to emphasize that each of us is a pilgrim on this earth. But not just pilgrims, but Christian pilgrims on a pilgrimage of Hope. Hope for the future. Hope for eternal life. "We desire the kingdom of heaven and eternal life as our happiness, placing our trust in Christ's promises and relying not on our own strength, but on the help of the grace of the Holy Spirit." (CCC, 1817)

May "Christ Jesus our Hope" continue to inspire us, sustain us and lead us to the Heavenly Kingdom where all of our hopes will be fulfilled in Hope Himself.



SPES NON CONFUNDIT

(HOPE DOES NOT DISAPPOINT)

JUBILEE 2025

From December 24, 2024, to January 6, 2026, the Catholic Church worldwide will be celebrating another Jubilee Year.

Now the time has come for a new Jubilee, when once more the Holy Door will be flung open to invite everyone to an intense experience of the love of God that awakens in hearts the sure hope of salvation in Christ. declares the Holy Father Pope Francis, as he



proclaims the celebration in the Papal Bull titled, Spes non confundit, which means "Hope does not disappoint." Let us therefore discover what this Jubilee is all about and what it means in the context of our Christian life.

In the Sacred scriptures, a Jubilee is a special year that is considered "sacred," that is, set apart or reserved for the Lord. Its celebration is described in the Old Testament, specifically in the Book of Leviticus: just as the Sabbath is celebrated every seven days and a sabbatical is marked every seven years, so a Jubilee concludes every period of seven times seven, or forty-nine years, and is observed on the 50th year. This year is set apart as a whole-sabbath year, a year sacred to the Lord, devoted to rest, renewal, and sanctification.

According to the Book of Leviticus: "then you shall sound the loud trumpet on the tenth day of the seventh month. On the day of Atonement, you shall sound the trumpet throughout all your land.

And you shall consecrate the 50th year, and proclaim liberty throughout the land to all its inhabitants. It shall be a Jubilee for you, when each of you shall return to his property and each of you shall return to his clan. That 50th year shall be a jubilee for you. In it, you shall neither sow nor reap what grows of itself, nor gather the grapes from the undressed vines, for it is a Jubilee. It shall be holy to you. (25:9-12)

The word Jubilee comes from the Hebrew word YOBEL, which refers to the horn of the male goat used as a trumpet to signal the beginning of the Holy year. In the account of Leviticus, apart from the aspect of rest, liberation is also prominent. In this year, debts are forgiven, and foreclosed lands are returned to their original owners. Thus, restoring social order and reducing the extreme inequality between the poor and the rich. The aspect of celebration is also emphasized, such that the word Jubilee has become synonymous with JOY and HAPPINESS.

The very first Jubilee in the church was set by Pope Boniface VIII in 1300 to celebrate the beginning of that century. At the same time, he also decreed that the Jubilee year be celebrated every 100 years. In 1470, Pope Paul II lowered the number of years before the next Jubilee to 50. And in 1475, Pope Sixtus IV reduced it to 25 years, a practice still followed today. This is why a Jubilee is celebrated every 25 years, commonly called an ordinary Jubilee. However, there are special years in which the Pope summons an extraordinary Jubilee for very special reasons.

The last one was the extraordinary Jubilee of mercy called by Pope Francis in 2015-2016 to commemorate the 50th anniversary of

the Second Vatican Council, while the next one will be held in 2033 as a commemoration and celebration of the 2000th anniversary of the Death and Resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ – indeed a celebration of our redemption.

To signal the start of the Jubilee, it has become tradition to open the Holy Doors in St. Peter's Basilica in the Vatican and in the other

major Papal Basilicas in Rome: St. John Lateran, St. Mary Major, and St. Paul outside the walls. The Holy Doors symbolize Jesus Christ Himself as the Door of our salvation. It is in this context that the Holy See instructed bishops around the world to designate pilgrimage sites in their local churches so that the faithful who may not



have the chance to go on pilgrimage to Rome may participate and receive the graces this Holy Year offers.

Every Jubilee year presents the opportunity of gaining plenary indulgences or the total remission of temporal punishment due to sin. We can apply these indulgences to ourselves. But we can also offer it for the souls in purgatory. The different ways of obtaining the Indulgence during this Jubilee are described in detail in the Decree.

On the granting of Indulgence during the Ordinary Jubilee Year 2025: the Latin motto or theme chosen for this Jubilee is "Peregrinantes in Spem" or Pilgrims of Hope; it reminds us that our life here on earth is a journey home to our Father in heaven and focuses our eyes on the hope that we are holding onto.

As the Holy Father tells us: "Everyone knows what it is to hope, in the heart of each

person. Hope dwells as a desire and expectation of good things to come despite our

not knowing what the future may bring." Despite the uncertainties of life and the problems that we bear each day. Hope pushes us to move forward, trusting in the



Father's love that will never let us down. One with the Holy Father and the entire Catholic Church throughout the world, may we celebrate this Jubilee with hearts full of Joy and be filled with the Hope that only our Lord Jesus Christ can bring and fulfill in our lives. A blessed Jubilee year to you all.

Dear brothers and sisters,

the bridge to reach God and His love. Help us, Lord, to help each other to build bridges—with dialogue, with encounter, uniting all of us to be one people always in peace. We must seek together how to be a missionary Church, always open to receive (people), like this square (St. Peter's), with open arms everyone, all those who need our charity, our presence, dialogue and love.

To all of you, brothers and sisters of Rome, of Italy, of the whole world, we want to be a synodal Church, a Church that walks, a Church that always seeks peace, that always seeks charity, that always seeks to be close especially to those who suffer."




OUR PILGRIMAGE OF FAITH APPEAL 2025




We are excited to share the results of our annual Pilgrimage of Faith for 2024! The generous contributions from the people of our Diocese have enabled us to support vital projects that extend beyond the scope of parish collection donations. Our Appeal supports Pastoral Programs, where the funding plays a crucial role in enhancing our pastoral initiatives across the Diocese. These programs often face funding gaps or are only partially supported by other income streams.

The chart below illustrates the allocation of the Pilgrimage of Faith (POF) fund spending in 2024. The 2024 budget was \$565,000, and an additional \$66,450 was spent, bringing the total to \$631,450. The extra funding came from the POF reserve set aside during the COVID pandemic, when government policies restricted outside programs. The balance of the reserve fund for future program costs is currently \$198,870.



The chart below shows the 2025 budget of \$605,000 and the amounts allocated to each program supported by the Pilgrimage of Faith Appeal.

Fr. Obi (Sylvester) celebrated Mass in St. Joseph Chapel, then gave the Secular Franciscans and friends a talk about love and service. He shared the second Joyful mystery, the Visitation. It was Mary's love that moved her to go to her cousin Elizabeth, who was going to give birth in her old age. He reinforced for us, the Little Flowers Fraternity, how difficult her journey was and the sacrifices she made, but it was her great love that moved her. Then he read Formation Director: Linda Adams, OFS. the Gospel of John, 21:15-17, explaining the reason why he chose that passage to talk about. Let us pray for them and congratulate them! Fr. Obi said that at the end of our lives, there are two things that we will account for:

Love and Service

Vice Minister: Paulette Wolfe, OFS



SETON HOUSE OF PRAYER RETREAT CENTRE: 51 YEARS OF SERVING SPIRITUAL NEEDS

St. Elizabeth Seton House of Prayer was originally founded in 1974 in Summerland, BC, by the Sisters of Charity of Halifax, and was named after St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, the foundress of the order. In 1986, Bishop Emmett Doyle acquired the land for its present location in Kettle Valley in Kelowna, off Upper Mission Drive, known as "Seton House," we offer a peaceful retreat for individuals seeking a getaway, whether for a day, a weekend, or a week-long stay. Many visitors express feelings of Your contributions ensure that this place of peacefulness while walking our grounds. The spiritual renewal experienced by retreatants encourages them to return year after year.

We are open year-round and can accommodate 33 guests at one time. Our dining room can seat 50 people. Seton House features a conference area in Emmett Hall, a chapel dedicated to St. Joseph the Carpenter, an indoor swimming pool, an outdoor Mass area known as Mary's Grove, a labyrinth, and two outdoor Stations of the Cross. Walking paths connect the Stations to the Chapel and Main Building.

Additionally, we offer a single-person hermitage called a "Poustinia," a Russian term meaning 'The Desert,' which serves as a space for prayer and contemplation, reminiscent of the time Jesus spent in the desert, strong in prayer.

Your continued support for Seton House through participation in retreats, donations to the Pilgrimage of Faith Appeal, the Annual Fundraiser, and the Parish collection is vital. spiritual nourishment continues to thrive within our Diocese. Thank you!.

Do not be Conformed to this World

Are you a thermometer, or a thermostat? Think carefully. There's a right and a wrong answer. A thermometer is passive. If you have a fever, it will cause your body temperature to rise. If your furnace isn't working in the winter, it will cause your house to drop in temperature. It reflects its environment, and that's all it does.

For a Christian, that's the wrong answer. We aren't supposed to be reflecting our environment, Pauline Dumas McGrath told the annual Gathering in the Spirit (GIS) in Kelowna August 12-16, "Do not be conformed to this world," St. Paul warns us, "but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect." (Romans 12:2).

A thermostat, Dumas McGrath said, is *active*. If your house is too cold, you can turn up the thermostat, and bingo! Up goes the temperature. A thermostat determines its

environment, not the other way around. That's what Christians are supposed to do.

"We align ourselves with God's will and allow ourselves to become His thermostats. We allow our minds to be transformed; then we can be like Jesus and create a kingdom atmosphere." It's right there in the Our Father: "hallowed be Thy name; Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven." "Once we bow before God, our job is to bring His kingdom on earth," Dumas McGrath said.

Jesus Hope of the World

The 17th Gathering in the Spirit (GIS) welcomed 32 participants to St. Elizabeth Seton House of Prayer for weekday sessions, while approximately 60 attendees joined the weekend sessions at St. Pius X Parish.

Organized by the Nelson Diocese Catholic Renewal Services, this year's theme was "Jesus, Hope of the World." Dumas McGrath served as the featured speaker for the third consecutive year. A resident of Ottawa, she is actively involved in her parish of St. Maurice, where she serves as co-team lead for discipleship, evangelization, and outreach.

Dumas is also a graduate of **Encounter School of Ministry** and volunteers at Encounter's Ottawa campus. As she did last year, she sent those attending the weekday sessions out into the streets and malls of Kelowna for an afternoon to offer to pray for passersby. Bringing God's kingdom to earth sounds like it might be above our pay grade, but it isn't, Dumas McGrath said. As baptized Christians, we "are not lacking in any spiritual gift" (1 Corinthians 1:7) because God "has qualified us to share in the inheritance of the saints in light" (Colossians 1:12 RSV). "You've already got your qualifications," she said. "Now you're ready to get to work."

The Power of the Holy Spirit is for Mission

This Saturday session focused on the source of our qualifications: the gifts of the Holy Spirit. Dumas McGrath noted that the Spirit is imparted in the sacrament of confirmation (as also at baptism). The Catechism of the Catholic Church (1302) says the effect of confirmation is the same as the experience of the apostles at Pentecost, but most recipients don't feel anything in particular during the sacrament,

and aren't taught to exercise the gifts. "I wasn't taught to expect that," she said.

What's more, she said, any teaching about the gifts of the Spirit in preparation for confirmation is usually limited to the seven gifts mentioned in Isaiah 11: wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety and fear of the Lord. These are real and important, Dumas McGrath said, but they aren't the whole story.

The Isaiah gifts are for our own holiness and edification, she said. But holiness and mission are two sides of the same coin. Jesus promises that the disciples will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes, and will be His witnesses "to the end of the earth." (Acts 1:8). "The power of the Holy Spirit is for mission," she said. And for mission, we need the gifts of the Spirit listed in 1 Corinthians 12: prophecy, discernment of spirits, word of knowledge, word of wisdom, speaking in tongues, interpretation of tongues, extraordinary faith, healing and miracles. These are gifts not for our own benefit, but for our ministry to other people. We have all these gifts by our baptism, but we need to ask the Holy Spirit to activate them in us. And ask again tomorrow, and every day after that. Then, we need to use them, to minister to other people.

Angel Gabriel's first words to Mary, "Do not be afraid"

Dumas McGrath's idea of ministering to others isn't limited to those who come to us or whom we meet in our prayer groups, or even in church. Friday's hour of prayer with strangers in Kelowna was a pale shadow of what she does most days in her own life, but she says we can do the same. If But though we must be careful, we meet a person or see a situation that calls for prayer, we should offer to pray. Not only that—we should be actively looking for prayer needs, as a routine part of our lives as Christians. "Scan the environment. Look for people," she said. God will "highlight" those who need prayer by bringing them to our attention through circumstances or through a sense in our spirits.

God will often give us a prophetic word about the person, spontaneously or when we ask for it. What comes instantly is more likely to be from God than what we take time to figure out for ourselves. If what we see or hear isn't clear, we can "press in" by asking God for more detail.

And yes, we can do this, Dumas McGrath said. "Every baptized Christian is a prophet." We need to be careful in sharing our prophetic words. "We don't always hear God 100 percent, so we need to ask the person if any of what we said resonated with them." We should tell people "I sense God

saying..." rather than "God says..." We should not prophesy births, deaths, dates, or vocations. And most of us are called only to prophesy words that are uplifting, encouraging, or consoling. It's a particular vocation to call people on their sins or lay down their duties to them, and most of us do not have that vocation.

we must also be bold. It isn't easy for most of us to speak about spiritual matters to strangers. As human beings, "your first go-to is to be afraid." Dumas McGrath said. But the angel Gabriel's first words to the Virgin Mary were, "Do not be afraid," and that's the message for us too, found throughout the Bible. God can make that happen. "Courage is fear that has said its prayers," Dumas McGrath said.

The Book of Acts is the continuation of the Apostles today.


In the first verse of the Acts of the Apostles, the author, Luke, describes the gospel he had already written as "all that Jesus *began* to do and teach." (RSV). Acts is about the continuation of that ministry through the apostles, and Dumas McGrath said that process stretches down to the present day.

"You are Spirit-filled and Spirit-led." she said. "Go out and continue Jesus' work of advancing God's Kingdom wherever you are!"

Jesus, the Way, the Truth and the Life

The 2024-2025 RCIA Journey at the Catholic Parishes of Penticton focused on our every step, every word, and every action centred on Jesus, the Way, the Truth, and the Life. Eleven candidates, eleven sponsors, guest presenters, one lead catechist, and one very dedicated pastor met weekly, discovering, encountering, and building an intimate, personal relationship with our loving God. Of course, all this culminated at our beautiful Easter Vigil with six Baptisms, three Receptions into Full Communion, nine Confirmations and nine First Holy Communions. One of our Candidates received their Sacraments in Summerland, and one other received Confirmation before the Easter vigil.

Our small group united on this most Holy Night with all those throughout the world on the same journey of discovery and relationship. Truly a journey of faith that marks only the beginning of the rest of their journey on the road we all travel upon to our eternal home. Intermingled with our regular sessions were the Rites so crucial to the RCIA process.

For our Inquirers, those seeking Full Communion into the Catholic Faith through the Sacraments of Initiation —Baptism, Confirmation, and Holy Eucharist —their first step was the Rite of Acceptance into the Order of Catechumens, as they expressed their intention to respond to God's call and to follow



the Way. Our second step, the Rite of Election, took place on the First Sunday of Lent, when those Elect called by God, placed their names in the Book of Elect, spending time in deep spiritual preparation, looking forward.

We celebrated the Scrutinize during
Lent— to help our Elect rely on God, to see their
weakness in the light of how sin enters our lives,
and to help them combat temptation with God's
grace. The presentations of the Apostles' Creed
and the Lord's Prayer enhanced their faith in
what they are called to.

For our Candidates, those seeking to come to the Catholic Church through their Profession of Faith, Confirmation, and Eucharist, the Rite of Welcoming Candidates formally introduced them to the congregations of the Catholic Parishes of Penticton, St. John Vianney, and St. Ann. The Rite of Calling Candidates to Lenten Renewal called them to continued conversion in preparation for their sacraments of Confirmation and Holy Eucharist.

Just before the beauty and joy of the Easter Vigil, we gathered for a prayerful miniretreat, with Father Neil Lustado and Deacon Peter d'Aoust as integral parts of the presentations. Now we turn to the Period of Mystagogy, our post-baptismal

catechesis period to allow them to reflect on their personal experience of the Easter Vigil and beyond through their Neophyte year.

Truly, Jesus the Way, the Truth and the Life has called them, and they have heard his call and have answered. May our Loving God, Jesus, our Way, Truth, and Life, and the Holy Spirit, walk with each of them

March 25, 2021, the Feast Day of the Annunciation, I wrote part of a reading in my journal. After my morning prayers, I went on with my day. Later that morning, my husband, Doug, came upstairs and called my name urgently. He told me that St. Paul's Hospital in Vancouver had called to see if he would come for tests because a donor kidney might be available for him.

After 7.5 years on dialysis, we were eager to accept the opportunity. We quickly packed our bags and left, enjoying the beautiful spring day, and arrived at the hospital in no time.

This felt like a miracle from God. After several tests, the hospital confirmed that the kidney was a perfect match! We are very grateful to the family who donated the kidney and to the staff at St. Paul's Hospital. The crucifix in each room and the hospital's history were comforting.

We want to share God's amazing Providence through our story. The doctors said the chances of finding a kidney match were one in 20,000! Throughout this journey, we felt God guiding us and taking care of every detail.

Our nurse's name was Emmanuella, and of course it was! We booked a beautiful one-bedroom hotel room in downtown Vancouver, just one block from St. Paul's Hospital, for only \$71 a night—no tax and free parking, which is absolutely unheard of!

Thanks to our generous friends, family members, and neighbours, all the logistical

details of leaving our house, pets, and home for six weeks were being taken care of.

Doug's kidney started working immediately and very efficiently, leading to his discharge two weeks early because he was doing so well. Hallelujah!

On our drive to Vancouver, we saw so many eagles.

All of this happened on a day filled with good news—the Feast of the Annunciation, which provided us with the perfect example of trusting in God's will. Thank you, Mother Mary, for your powerful, fervent, and generous intercessions! You, who are the health of the sick!

Isaiah 40:31 states, "but those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint."

Praise and glory to God! We experienced a tremendous miracle and are very humbled and grateful for it. We all receive many miracles, some larger than others. In this Jubilee year of Hope, may all our hopes soar like the wings of eagles, and may we trust that nothing is impossible with God!



A JOURNEY OF FAITH AND HOPE: THE JUBILEE OF YOUTH 2025

"Dear young people, Jesus is our hope. It is He, as Saint John Paul II once said, 'who stirs in you the desire to do something great with your lives [...] to commit to improving yourselves and society, making the world more human and more fraternal.' Let us remain united with Him. rooted in His friendship, and cultivate this relationship through prayer, adoration, Eucharistic Communion, frequent Confession, and generous charity. Follow the example of Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati and Saint Carlo Acutis, who has been declared a Saint on, September 7, 2025. Aspire to greatness—to holiness—wherever you are. Do not settle for less. You will see the light of the Gospel growing every day, in you and around you."

These were the moving words of Pope Leo during the Final Mass at Tor Vergata, the closing celebration of the Jubilee of Youth in Rome (July 28—August 3, 2025)

The Diocese of Nelson joyfully sent 48 delegates, youth, parents as chaperones, and spiritual leaders Fr. Obi (Sylvester) and myself Fr. Ferdinand, to this extraordinary pilgrimage, organized by the Nelson Diocese.

A living Faith in the Heart of the Church

The pilgrimage was an unforgettable encounter with the living faith of the Catholic Church. The delegates were uplifted by witnessing millions of young people from every corner of the world gathered together in the very heart of the Church, joyfully proclaiming the name of Jesus. Truly, the youth are the hope of the Church!

Before the Jubilee of Youth, the group embarked on a spiritual journey across Italy, visiting holy sites, shrines of saints, and the Four Holy Doors to celebrate the Jubilee Year.

They prayed at the four papal Basilicas: St. Peter's, St. John Lateran, St. Mary Major, and St. Paul Outside the Walls. These Holy Doors, opened only during Jubilee years, are profound symbols of God's mercy and renewal. Passing through them is not only a sacred tradition but also a reminder of God's infinite forgiveness and the call to begin anew.

The Group was also blessed to visit the Vatican Museums, the Vatican Gardens, and the shrines of St. Rita, Blessed Carlo Acutis,

St. Thomas, and the site of St. Paul's martyrdom at Tre Fontane (Three Fountains). Each visit touched hearts deeply, showing how the saints lived their lives fully for Christ. Their examples inspired the young pilgrims to follow in their footsteps with courage and joy.

The Jubilee of Youth: A Celebration of Hope

The highlight of the pilgrimage was, without question, the **Jubilee of Youth**. The days were filled with concerts, talks, testimonies, and powerful moments of prayer. The faith of young people was alive expressed through music, words, and witness.

One unforgettable moment was the Sacrament of Reconciliation at the Circus Maximus, where countless young people patiently lined up under the sun to receive God's mercy. The sight of priests journeying with them in confession was a moving testimony of the depth of God's love and forgiveness.

The pilgrimage walk to Tor Vergata was another life-changing experience. Though the journey was long and hot, the joy and faith of the young pilgrims never wavered. During the evening prayer vigil, Pope Leo listened to the heartfelt questions of the youth and then led them in adoration of the Blessed Sacrament. Despite the presence of millions, a profound silence filled the field, a silence of reverence, unity, and love for Christ.

That night, the pilgrims camped under the stars, their hearts overflowing with faith.

The Final Mass: A New Beginning

The closing Mass was a moment of great joy and reverence. The youth welcomed Pope Leo with resounding shouts, yet when the Eucharist was celebrated, a deep spirit of worship embraced the crowd. They listened attentively to the Word of God and received the Body of Christ with renewed faith and hope.

As the celebration ended, the young people did not leave empty-handed. They returned home carrying treasures of faith, joy, and purpose to share with their families, parishes, and communities.


